Big Wakoo Fence, Inc. Bid Category 2, fencing and gates for \$185,000. On June 16, 2018, the board authorized staff to enter into an agreement with RK & G Construction, Inc., Bid Category 3, general construction for the Alice Shaw Site Safety Project. Each bid total included allowances. An allowance is defined as an amount specified and included in the construction contract or specifications for a certain item of work whose details are not yet determined at the time of contracting. The allowance would cover any additional work that

was required to complete the project.

Both contracts used a portion of the allowance outlined in the bid documents. Below are the amounts of the allowances not used and considered a deductive change order and contract adjustment.

BACKGROUND: Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 1808) which (1)

exempts CSPP programs from specified licensure and regulation requirements if they are operated in a school building and (2) requires that the district's Williams uniform complaint procedures be used to resolve allegations of deficiencies related to health and safety requirements in license-exempt CSPP programs. Policy reflects a provision of AB 1808 which allows districts to commingle 4-year-old children enrolled in a CSPP program with children enrolled in a transitional kindergarten (TK)

program under specified conditions.

PRESCHOOL/EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

The Board of Trustees recognizes that the value of high-quality preschool experiences helps children ages 3-4 years to develop to enhance children's social-emotional development, knowledge, skills, abilities and attributes necessary for a successful transition into the elementary education program. The Board desires to provide children ages 3-4 years access to Early education programs should provide developmentally appropriate activities in a safe, adequately supervised, and cognitively rich environment.

Collaboration with Community Programs

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with the local child care and development planning council, other public agencies, organizations, the county office of education, and/or private preschool providers to assess the availability of preschool programs in the community and the extent to which the community's preschool needs are being met. The Board encourages the development of a comprehensive districtwide and/or community-wide plan to increase children's access to high-quality preschool programs.

District preschool programs shall comply with all health and safety laws and regulations, including, when applicable, licensure requirements pursuant to 22 CCR 101156.

The Board shall approve for the district's preschool program a written philosophical statement, goals, and objectives that reflect the cultural and linguistic characteristics of the families to be served and address the program components specified in 5 CCR 18272-18281 and the accompanying administrative regulation. (5 CCR 18271)

The Board shall set priorities for establishing or expanding services as resources become available, giving consideration to the benefits of providing early education programs for at-risk children and/or children residing in the attendance areas of the lowest performing district schools.

Preschool admissions policies and procedures shall be in writing and available to the public. Such policies and procedures shall include criteria designating those children whose needs can be met by the program and services, the ages of children who will be accepted, program activities, any supplementary services provided, any field trip provisions, any transportation arrangements, food service provisions, and a health examination requirement. (CCR 18105; 22 CCR 101218)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that subsidized preschool is provided to eligible families to the extent that state and/or federal funding is available and shall establish enrollment priorities in accordance with Education Code 8263 and 5 CCR 18106.

ATHLETIC COMPETITION

PLACEMENT IN MATHEMATICS COURSES

The Board of Trustees believes that a sound educational program must include the study of subjects that prepare students for admission to higher education and/or a fulfilling career. To the extent possible, District students shall be provided an opportunity to complete a sequence of mathematics courses recommended for admission into the University of California and California State University systems.

Such placement protocols shall systematically take into consideration multiple objective academic measures that may include, but are not limited to, interim and summative assessments, placement tests that are aligned to state-adopted content standards in mathematics, classroom assignment and grades, and report cards.

District staff shall implement the placement protocols uniformly and without regard to students' socioeconomic background or any characteristic specified in BP 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities, including, but not limited to, race, sex, gender, nationality, and ethnicity, socioeconomic background, or other subjective or discriminatory consideration in making placement decisions.

Students shall be enrolled in mathematics courses based on the placement protocols. No student shall repeat a mathematics course which he/she has successfully completed based on the district's placement protocols.

The placement protocols shall provide for at least one reevaluation specify a time within the first month of the school year when students shall be reevaluated to ensure that they students are appropriately placed in mathematics courses and shall specify the criteria the district will use to make this determination. Any student found to be misplaced shall be promptly placed in the appropriate mathematics course.

Within 10 school days of an initial placement decision or a placement decision upon reevaluation,—If a student and or his/her parent/guardian questions who disagree with the placement of the student, he/she may appeal the decision to the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee shall decide whether or not to overrule the placement determination within 10 school days of receiving the appeal. The decision of the Superintendent or designee shall be final.

The Superintendent or designee shall also report on the percentage of district students who have successfully completed mathematics courses that satisfy the requirements for entrance to the University of California and the California State University.

BACKGROUND: Policy updated to reflect new federal law (P.L. 115-224) which

reauthorizes the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act, retitled as the Strengthening Career and Technical Education for the 21st Century Act, and new law (AB 1808) which amends the California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program. This change includes material regarding activities for special populations and consultation with private school representatives moved to the Administrative Regulation corresponding with this BP. Material on program evaluation will be revised to add requirement to review measures of career technical education pathway completion as part of the annual review of progress toward the goals in the

local control and accountability plan (LCAP).

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the

proposed revision of BP 6178.

FUNDING: No funding implications.

Instruction BP 6178 (a)

Career Technical Education

The Charter School Board of Directors desires to provide a comprehensive career technical education (CTE) programming in grades 9-12 which integrates core academic instruction with technical and occupational instruction in order to increase student achievement, graduation rates, and readiness for postsecondary education and employment. The district's CTE program shall be designed to help students develop the academic, career, and technical skills needed to succeed in a knowledge- and skills-based economy. The program shall include a rigorous academic component and provide students with practical experience and understanding of all aspects of an industry.

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The district's CTE program shall focus on preparing students to enter current or emerging high-skill, high-wage, and/or high-demand occupations. CTE opportunities may be offered through linked learning programs, partnership academies, apprenticeship programs or orientation to apprenticeships, regional occupational centers or programs (ROC/Ps), charter schools, small learning communities, magnet programs, K-14 Career Education offerings, or other programs that expose students to career options while preparing them for future careers in a given industry or interest area.

The Board of Directors shall review and approve all district plans and applications for the use of state and/or federal funds supporting CTE.

The Board shall adopt district standards for CTE which meet or exceed the state's model content standards and describe the essential knowledge and skills that students enrolled in these courses are expected to master. The course curriculum shall be aligned with district-adopted standards and the state's curriculum framework.

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The Superintendent or designee shall develop partnerships with local businesses and industries to ensure that course sequences, career technical and integrated curriculum, classroom instruction and projects, and assessments have real-world relevance and reflect labor market needs and priorities. He/she shall also work to develop connections with businesses, postsecondary institutions, community organizations, and/or other employers to provide students with actual or simulated work-based learning opportunities.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with postsecondary institutions to ensure that the district's program is articulated with postsecondary programs in order to provide a sequential course of study. Articulation opportunities may include dual or concurrent enrollment in community college courses.

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The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers of CTE courses possess the qualifications and credentials necessary to teach their assigned courses. He/she also shall provide teachers and administrators with professional development designed to enhance their knowledge occupational instruction with academic instruction of standards-aligned CTE and shall provide opportunities for CTE teachers to collaborate with teachers of academic courses in the development and implementation of integrated curriculum models.

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The Charter High School shall provide services to support students in the CTE program, including comprehensive career guidance and academic counseling. Based on such data, the Board shall determine the need for program improvements and update the goals in the district's local control and accountability plan as necessary.

Prior to the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall advise students, parents/guardians, employees, and the general public that all CTE opportunities are offered without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, or disability. (34 CFR 104.8, 106.9) any actual or perceived characteristic protected from discrimination by law. The notification shall be disseminated in languages other than English as needed and shall state that the district will take steps to ensure that the lack of English language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in the district's CTE program. (20 USC 2354; 34 CFR 100 Appendix B, 104.8, 106.9)

Advisory Committee

The Board shall appoint a CTE advisory committee will develop recommendations on the district's CTE program and will serve as a liaison between the district and potential employers. The committee shall consist of one or more representatives of the general public knowledgeable about the disadvantaged; students; teachers; business; industry; school administration; and of at least one student, teacher, business representative, industry representative, school administrator, member of the general public knowledgeable about the disadvantaged, and representative of the field office of the California Department of Employment Development. (Education Code 8070)

The Board shall monitor and evaluate the achievement of students participating in the district's CTE program. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on program enrollment and completion rates. systematically review the district's CTE courses to determine the degree to which each course may offer an alternative means for completing and receiving credit for specific portions of the course of study prescribed by the district for high school graduation. The Board shall ensure that these classes are equivalent in content and rigor to the courses prescribed for graduation. (Education Code 52376)

Memorandum of Understanding and Agreement to Provide Student Teacher Placements to University Students

This agreement is between the Orcutt Union Sch District ("District") and the California University's CalStateTEACH Program ("University"), who may be referred State This and confirms the collectively the parties. Agreement describes the Parties expectations and responsibilities of regarding the Student Teaching Program through which University students enrolled in a credentialing program ("Student Teachers") will gain experience in the public school setting.

TERM OF THE AGREEMENT

DISTRICT AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. The District will provide the Student Teachers with supervised clinical experience. The District's Designated Supervisor(s) will hold an appropriate degree, credential or license in the specified field, if any is required for that field, and at least five years' experience in that field. The Supervisor will provide the Student Teacher with at least two hours of face-to-face supervision per week for the duration of the student teaching. Supervision may be shared among more than one qualified District staff member.
- 2. The District will designate a member of its staff to participate with the University's designee in planning, implementing, and coordinating the student teaching program.
- 3. The District may, in its sole discretion, refuse to accept as a participant in the Student Teaching Program any University student assigned to participate, and, upon request of the District, University shall withdraw the assignment of any University student participant.
- 4. After the District accepts the assignment of a Student Teacher, the District may terminate the student teaching for "good cause." "Good cause" may include, but is not limited to failure to perform satisfactorily, refusal to follow District administrative policies,

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procedures, rules and regulations, or violation of any federal or state law. The District will immediately notify University in writing if it terminates an assignment. The District reserves the right to ban anyone from District facilities when the District finds, in its sole discretion that the presence of the person poses a threat or disrupts operations. University is responsible for informing its student participants of the provisions of this Section. District will immediately notify University, if District knows or suspects any professional or ethical or legal violations. University will cooperate with District in any investigation concerning the reported violation.

6. District shall, on any day when a Student Teacher is receiving training at its facilities, arrange for the Student Teacher to receive any necessary emergency health care or first aid for accidents occurring in its facilities. Except as provided in this paragraph, District shall have no obligation to furnish medical care, surgical care or other health care to any Student Teacher.

UNIVERSITY RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. University will work collaboratively with the District's HR department, school site administration, and staff in the assignment of the Student Teacher.
- 2. University will confer regularly with District and site administration and district-employed mentor/liaison through meetings, telephone calls, and/or e-mail.
- 3. University will immediately notify appropriate District and site administration if University administration has knowledge of or suspects any professional or ethical violations by a Student Teacher in the school. University and District agree they will cooperate in any investigation concerning the reported violation.
- 4. University will guarantee that Student Teachers and university supervisors have appropriate tuberculosis and fingerprinting clearance, including subsequent arrest notification service.
- 5. University will instruct Student Teachers in state laws regarding child abuse reporting, sexual harassment and professional conduct.
- 6. University supervisors will conduct systematic and regular observations of Student Teachers' performances in the District's classrooms.
- 7. University will be responsible for ensuring that Student Teachers have appropriate insurance coverage.

STUDENT TEACHER RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Provide the District with the following documentation:
 - a. a copy of the letter from the University assigning the student to the District.
 - b. a background check fingerprint clearance report.
 - c. a negative tuberculosis test result, and
- 2. Comply with all applicable terms and provisions of this Agreement while serving as a Student Teacher.
- 3. Comply with the District's policies and procedures, and applicable state and federal laws





and regulations while serving as a Student Teacher.

- 4. Provide services to District pupils only under the direct supervision of District staff.
- 5. Maintain the confidentiality of pupil information. No Student Teacher will have access to or have the right to receive any District pupil records, except to the extent necessary in the regular course of assisting in providing services to pupils as part of the student teaching program. The discussion, transmission, or narration in any form by Student Teachers of any individually identifiable pupil information, educational, medical or otherwise, which is obtained in the course of the student teaching program is forbidden except as a necessary part of the practical student teaching experience. Otherwise, Student Teachers shall use de- identified information only (and not personally identifiable pupil information) in any discussions about the student teaching experience with University, its employees, agents or others.

STATUS OF DISTRICT AND UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

The parties expressly understand and agree that all University students serving as Student Teachers in District schools pursuant to this Agreement are doing so for educational purposes only, and Student Teachers are not considered employees of the District for any purpose, including, but not limited to, compensation for services, welfare and pension benefits, or workers' compensation insurance. It is the responsibility of University to provide notice to its student participants of the provisions of this Section. The provisions of this Section shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

LIABILITY INSURANCE & WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The University shall take out and maintain a "claims-made" policy of general liability and professional liability insurance (including personal injury with limits not less than \$1 million per loss and damage to property of others up to \$5,000 per incident), with extended reporting period of three (3) years, covering Student Teachers, and naming District as an additional named insured under such insurance policy or policies. Further, University agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance, with no exclusion for molestation or abuse, at a minimum of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) per occurrence and Four Million Dollars (\$4,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement.

Further, University shall provide written notice that should any of the above described policies be canceled before the expiration thereof, notice will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions. University also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage on Student Teachers, any individuals characterized as employees of University and instructors working at District pursuant to this Agreement at all times during the course of this Agreement.

University shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this Section within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis. If the coverage is on a claims-made basis, University hereby agrees that not less than thirty (30) days prior to the





effective date of termination of University's current insurance coverage or termination of this Agreement, University shall either purchase three (3) year tail coverage per claim or provide proof of continuous coverage in the above stated amounts for all claims arising out of incidents occurring prior to termination of University's current coverage or prior to termination of this Agreement, as applicable, and provide District a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.

The University is permissibly self-insured through the State of California for automobile liability. The District shall be named as an additional insured or covered party on the liability coverages maintained by the University set forth above, and such coverages shall be primary to any coverages maintained by the District. Limits of liability for each type of liability coverage shall be at least \$1 million per claim per occurrence/\$2 million aggregate.

NO WORKERS' COMPENSATION LIABILITY

The Parties agree that the District is not to assume, nor shall it assume by this Agreement any liability under the California Workers' Compensation Insurance and Safety Act for, by or on behalf of any Student Teacher or University employees while they are on the premises of the District or while performing any duty whatsoever under the terms of the Agreement or while going to or from any of the student teaching placement sites. University shall provide written notice to each Student Teacher regarding the lack of coverage of Workers' Compensation insurance by the District.

INDEMNIFICATION

University shall defend, indemnify and hold District and its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement, but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of University, its officials, agents, or employees.

District shall defend, indemnify and hold University, its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damage arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of District, its officials, agents, or employees.

ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

- 1. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed to create a joint venture, partnership, principal-agent or employment relationship between the parties and neither party shall have the authority to bind the other party for any purpose.
- 2. This Agreement and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be governed and construed by the laws of the State of California. Any lawsuit concerning or arising out of





this Agreement shall be venued in the county in which the District is located.

- 3. This Agreement supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings between the parties, both oral and written, with respect to its subject matter and constitutes the complete agreement and understanding between the parties, unless modified in a writing executed by both parties.
- 4. In the event of a dispute between the parties arising from this Agreement, the parties agree to mediate the dispute before initiating litigation. The Parties agree that with regard to any dispute or claim related to this Agreement, prior to the initiation of a lawsuit or other legal action, they shall and must, in good faith, submit the claim or dispute to mediation with any mutually agreeable neutral. The costs of the neutral will be split equally between the Parties. The prevailing party shall be entitled to recovery from the losing party the prevailing party's reasonable expenses (fees and costs) incurred in the lawsuit or legal action as allowed by law.
- 5. If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid or unenforceable, that provision shall be amended to achieve as nearly as possible the same effect as the original provision, and the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 6. No delay or failure by either party to act in the event of a breach or default hereunder shall be construed as a waiver of that or any succeeding breach or a waiver of the provision itself.
- 7. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original as against any party whose signature appears and all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.
